Demographic Profile

The population in the Kirbyville village, MO was 129 per American Community Survey data for 2017-2021.

The region has a civilian labor force of 50 with a participation rate of 45.0%. Of individuals 25 to 64 in the Kirbyville village, MO, 7.2% have a bachelor's degree or higher which compares with 35.1% in the nation.

The median household income in the Kirbyville village, MO is \$46,250 and the median house value is \$111,500.



Employment Trends

As of 2023Q1, total employment for the Kirbyville village, MO was 181 (based on a four-quarter moving average). Over the year ending 2023Q1, employment increased 1.7% in the region.



Wage Trends

The average worker in the Kirbyville village, MO earned annual wages of \$36,473 as of 2023Q1. Average annual wages per worker decreased 1.8% in the region over the preceding four quarters. For comparison purposes, annual average wages were \$68,501 in the nation as of 2023Q1.



Annual average wages per worker data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and imputed where necessary. Data are updated through 2022Q4 with preliminary estimates updated to 2023Q1.



Cost of Living Index

The Cost of Living Index estimates the relative price levels for consumer goods and services. When applied to wages and salaries, the result is a measure of relative purchasing power. The cost of living is 14.0% lower in Kirbyville village, MO than the U.S. average.



Industry Snapshot

The largest sector in the Kirbyville village, MO is Educational Services, employing 68 workers. The next-largest sectors in the region are Other Services (except Public Administration) (36 workers) and Construction (35). High location quotients (LQs) indicate sectors in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The sectors with the largest LQs in the region are Wholesale Trade (LQ = 4.91), Educational Services (4.69), and Other Services (except Public Administration) (4.58).





Employment data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and imputed where necessary. Data are updated through 2022Q4 with preliminary estimates updated to 2023Q1.

Sectors in the Kirbyville village, MO with the highest average wages per worker are Transportation and Warehousing (\$58,814), Wholesale Trade (\$51,826), and Educational Services (\$42,175). Regional sectors with the best job growth (or most moderate job losses) over the last 10 years are Other Services (except Public Administration) (+35 jobs), Construction (+31), and Educational Services (+17).

Over the next 10 years, employment in the Kirbyville village, MO is projected to contract by 9 jobs. The fastest growing sector in the region is expected to be Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation with a +0.0% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Transportation and Warehousing (0 jobs), Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting (0), and Health Care and Social Assistance (0).

Occupation Snapshot

The largest major occupation group in the Kirbyville village, MO is Educational Instruction and Library Occupations, employing 47 workers. The next-largest occupation groups in the region are Office and Administrative Support Occupations (24 workers) and Construction and Extraction Occupations (21). High location quotients (LQs) indicate occupation groups in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The major groups with the largest LQs in the region are Educational Instruction and Library Occupations (LQ = 4.84), Community and Social Service Occupations (3.43), and Construction and Extraction Occupations (2.55).

Occupation groups in the Kirbyville village, MO with the highest average wages per worker are Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations (\$89,800), Management Occupations (\$85,600), and Computer and Mathematical Occupations (\$82,500). The unemployment rate in the region varied among the major groups from n/a among n/a to n/a among n/a.

Over the next 10 years, the fastest growing occupation group in the Kirbyville village, MO is expected to be Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations with a +0.2% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Educational Instruction and Library Occupations (0 jobs) and Management Occupations (0). Over the same period, the highest separation demand (occupation demand due to retirements and workers moving from one occupation to another) is expected in Educational Instruction and Library Occupations (41 jobs) and Office and Administrative Support Occupations (27).


Occupation employment data are estimated via industry employment data and the estimated industry/occupation mix. Industry employment data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and currently updated through 2022Q4, imputed where necessary with preliminary estimates updated to 2023Q1. Wages by occupation are as of 2023 provided by the BLS and imputed where necessary. Forecast employment growth uses national projections from the Bureau of Labor Statistics adapted for regional growth patterns.



Education Levels

Expected growth rates for occupations vary by the education and training required. While all employment in the Kirbyville village, MO is projected to contract 0.5% over the next ten years, occupations typically requiring a postgraduate degree are expected to grow 0.0% per year, those requiring a bachelor's degree are forecast to contract 0.2% per year, and occupations typically needing a 2-year degree or certificate are expected to contract 0.3% per year.

FAQ

What is a location quotient?

A location quotient (LQ) is a measurement of concentration in comparison to the nation. An LQ of 1.00 indicates a region has the same concentration of an industry (or occupation) as the nation. An LQ of 2.00 would mean the region has twice the expected employment compared to the nation and an LQ of 0.50 would mean the region has half the expected employment in comparison to the nation.

What is separation demand?

Separation demand is the number of jobs required due to separations—labor force exits (including retirements) and turnover resulting from workers moving from one occupation into another. Note that separation demand does not include all turnover—it does not include when workers stay in the same occupation but switch employers. The total projected demand for an occupation is the sum of the separation demand and the growth demand (which is the increase or decrease of jobs in an occupation expected due to expansion or contraction of the overall number of jobs in that occupation).

What is a cluster?

A cluster is a geographic concentration of interrelated industries or occupations. If a regional cluster has a location quotient of 1.25 or greater, the region is considered to possess a competitive advantage in that cluster.

What is the difference between industry wages and occupation wages?

Industry wages and occupation wages are estimated via separate data sets, often the time periods being reported do not align, and wages are defined slightly differently in the two systems (for example, certain bonuses are included in the industry wages but not the occupation wages). It is therefore common that estimates of the average industry wages and average occupation wages in a region do not match exactly.

What is NAICS?

The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) is used to classify business establishments according to the type of economic activity. The NAICS Code comprises six levels, from the "all industry" level to the 6-digit level. The first two digits define the top level category, known as the "sector," which is the level examined in this report.

What is SOC?

The Standard Occupational Classification system (SOC) is used to classify workers into occupational categories. All workers are classified into one of over 804 occupations according to their occupational definition. To facilitate classification, occupations are combined to form 22 major groups, 95 minor groups, and 452 occupation groups. Each occupation group includes detailed occupations requiring similar job duties, skills, education, or experience.
